Litany of Lament


- While I was at the grocery store, another patron referred to me as "another one of those damn Chinese trying to infect everyone into communism."

Community left behind: Asian American businesses affected by COVID-19

Asian American unemployment has quadrupled since the pandemic hit.

- Economic Cost of Racism (Huang et al 2023)
 - 18.4% decrease in traffic in Asian restaurants (estimated US\$7.42 billion lost revenue in 2020)
- Small Business Revenue Decline (JP Morgan Chase Institute 2020)
 - While small business receipts declined 13% nationwide, receipts of Asian-owned businesses dropped 60%--almost five times more
- Employment Disruptions (Ong and Mar 2020)
 - 233,000 Asian-owned businesses closed from Feb – April, a 28% decline
 - 75% of nearly 2 m. small businesses can't access govt assistance
 - 83% of AAs with HS degree or less filed unemployment claims in CA (v. 37% of others with similar education)

Asian Americans facing slower economic recovery

Impacts of Anti-Asian Hate: Mental Health and Health

- 63% of AAPIs report on-going violence's negative impact on mental health (Coqual 2023)
 - 45% report negative impact on health
- Direct experience of hate associated with (Shimkhada and Ponce 2022)
 - Serious psychological distress
 - Foregoing necessary appointments
 - Not feeling safe in one's neighborhood





Impacts of Anti-Asian Hate: Mental Health and Health

Greatest Sources of Stress Anti-Asian Discrimination Quarantine/Social Distancing Impact on Family Physical Health 71.7% 66.2% 52.9% 49.8% 47.0% 34.3% National Asian American Needs Assessment SAH Respondents

- The Negative Health Effects of Anti-Asian Stigma in the U.S. During COVID-19 (Bresnahan et al 2023)
- Wu et al (2020) (n=7778) AAPIs exp disproportionate stress and anxiety
- Hahm et al (2021) 70% of AAPI young adults exp discrim resulting in stress
- Cheah et al (2021): CA children exp more depression and anxiety

We send our deepest condolences to those who have lost their loved ones. We feel grief and anger.

We recall moments when we faced discrimination as Asians. We have endured expletives without reason and were mocked for the way we look. We were even asked why Asians spoke in English.

We cannot put into words the pain of becoming the subject of hatred and violence for such a reason. Our own experiences are inconsequential compared to the events that have occurred over the past few weeks. But these experiences were enough to make us feel powerless and chip away our self-estem.

What is happening right now cannot be dissociated from our identity as Asians. It required considerable time for us to discuss this carefully and we contemplated deeply on how we should voice our message.

But what our voice must convey is clear.

We stand against racial discrimination. We condemn violence. You, I and we all have the right to be respected. We will stand together.
